New High Tech Investigation Techniques (*Basic*)

Open Source Intelligence Techniques

Orland Park Police Department

Course Description: This course identifies and demonstrates over 250 free online resources that can aid Investigators in solving both technical and non-technical crimes. Participants will be shown how to "dig" into the internet for personal information about any target. While popular sites such as Twitter, Instagram, and Facebook are covered in detail (including techniques that legally access some "private" content), the presentation goes much deeper into the vast resources available online for researching personal information. Additionally, instructions for identifying local events such as flash mobs and fights in real time will be presented in great detail. Aside from web sites, other technologies such as digital camera data, document meta-data, Geo-location services, and live communication monitoring will be explained. These sources can also be used to conduct thorough background checks on potential employees. All resources can be applied to domestic and international investigations.

Among many other techniques, the attendees will learn how to conduct the following queries:

- Conduct advanced search queries on dozens of search engines
- Identify users of private cellular telephone numbers
- Access restricted information through cached results
- Use online translation tools to search and translate foreign text
- Monitor live content and communication on all social networks
- Create online map layers to identify communication by location
- Conduct thorough searches of all social networks
- Access content believed to be private on social networks
- Search Geo Location data within Twitter, Flickr, and Instagram streams
- Analyze micro blogging content by location
- Reverse search photographs for additional copies and details
- Search historical deleted versions of websites
- Locate documents related to target subject
- Identify crime rings using online auction sites
- Locate online photo albums shared by target subjects
- Locate online videos related to subject of investigation
- Analyze EXIF data in photographs to identify camera info and location
- Search online forums for communication
- View additional satellite imagery of locations
- Identify cropped and manipulated photographs
- Locate personal addresses of practically anyone
- Retrieve Caller ID information from any landline or cellular telephone number
- Identify all social networks in use by target username

His previous books, "Open Source Intelligence Techniques" and "Hiding from the Internet", have been top sellers in both the United States and Europe. They are used by several government agencies as training manuals for intelligence gathering and securing personal information.

New High Tech Investigation Techniques (*Advanced*)

Open Source Intelligence Techniques

Course Description: This course will provide students with several enhanced techniques for identifying and demonstrating online resources that compile many of the resources presented during the Basic level course. These automated processes can aid investigators in solving both technical and non-technical crimes. Participants will be shown how to request, retrieve, and analyze content received during these processes.

The training site features wireless internet access. Participants are encouraged, but not required, to bring a laptop computer.

Case Examples

Actual case examples are demonstrated that apply several of the techniques discussed to solve a series of online investigations. This demonstration gives a complete view of how the techniques are used in unison to solve individual cases.

Intel Analysis Software

This session will demonstrate over 20 free software tools that will aid an investigator during any type of investigation. A custom portable web browser will be given to each participant that includes configured plugins that add new search features. These include reverse image location, automatic media download, instant screen capture, and more. Additionally, the browser is configured to block website analytics that can divulge sensitive information about the searcher. Other software includes tools that clone websites, locate twitter data, recover deleted files, display historical versions of satellite mapping data, change an IP address, extract still images from videos, Track GPS devices, locate additional social networks, and identify metadata within online documents. Attendees will have full access to the entire collection of software demonstrated during the session.

Online Investigation Techniques

The audience will be shown how to use advanced technologies to assist with any type of investigation. Topics include identifying compromised email addresses, "spoofing" caller ID and email addresses, anonymous forwarding email addresses, anonymous forwarding phone numbers, identifying shortened links, monitoring online digital radio frequencies, locating stolen data phones, identifying rental vehicle information, discovering anyone's IP address, and more. All procedures will be explained from start to finish and links will be available to all participants.

Crisis Intervention Team Training (CIT)

40-Hour State Certified Course

Purpose:

Law enforcement officers are generally the first responders to crisis events. This course is also open to local and county sworn corrections officers. It is important to have individuals in law enforcement who can utilize effective strategies, insuring public and personal safety. The Crisis Intervention Team (CIT) training provides officers with education about mental illness and other behavioral disabilities as well as providing skills and tools for effectively and safely interacting with someone who is experiencing a crisis.

Course Description:

Crisis Intervention Team training is an in-depth 40-hour specialized course of study for uniformed patrol law enforcement officers and sworn corrections officers who, in addition to their regular service calls, will be required to respond to crisis calls involving people who have behavioral disabilities. CIT officers will use their acquired knowledge and skill to effectively handle crisis situations and make the most appropriate disposition, which will best serve the individual and the community.

The key components of this course cover the following:

- Officers are exposed to the dynamics of mental illness, developmental disabilities, child and adolescent disorders, elderly individuals with behavioral issues, returning combat veterans, people who have excited delirium, and people with substance abuse/co-occurring disorders. This training will allow officers to make quick and effective decisions utilizing options they have to resolve the crisis.
- Officers are exposed to the experiences, viewpoints and concerns of persons with mental illnesses (consumers). Officers will meet with consumers in order to gain their perspective and learn from them.
- Officers receive instruction and demonstrations in basic listening and responding skills along with crisis interventions strategies. Real life crisis scenarios provided by trained professional actors with the assistance of state-certified CIT officers are presented to officers for them to demonstrate their resolution skills.

About the Instructors:

The course will be conducted by a diverse group of law enforcement and behavioral health professionals, including active CIT officers from various parts of the State of Illinois. An essential part of the CIT course is scenario-based skills training. All scenarios are facilitated and evaluated by certified CIT officers.

Basic Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design Training (CPTED)

Course Description: Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design (CPTED) is based on the principle that proper design and effective use of buildings and public spaces in neighborhoods can lead to a reduction in the fear and incidence of crime, and an improvement in the quality of life. CPTED's goal is to prevent crime through designing a physical environment that positively influences human behavior. It is based on four principles: natural access control, natural surveillance, territoriality, and maintenance. Participants will learn the basics of CPTED principles and how they work; apply successful applications and techniques of CPTED to specific crimes; consider CPTED principles in plans to secure key public places, schools, and facilities; and conduct a community safety assessment using CPTED principles.

Course Objectives:

- CPTED theory, overview of history of crime and physical environment, CPTED principles and how they apply to problem solving, community planning, and conducting safety and security assessments
- CPTED applications to specific crimes and "hot spots" locations
- Specific practical techniques including street and security lighting, landscaping, barriers, traffic calming, and target hardening
- Role of maintenance, ordinances, and other local laws in strategies to prevent crime and improve quality of life
- How to link neighborhood volunteers to local crime prevention, community building, and homeland security initiatives
- How to consider CPTED principles in plans to secure key public places and facilities

The Reid Technique of Interviewing and Interrogation®

Course Description:

This is a twenty-one hour program on the Reid Technique of Interviewing and Interrogation®. The course includes; interview and interrogation preparation, behavior symptoms, the Reid® Behavior Analysis Interview (B.A.I.) and "The Reid Nine Steps of Interrogation" which include:

Interview and Interrogation Preparation

The style, appearance and approach of the successful interviewer and interrogator will be covered, as will the room settings conducive to these activities.

Behavior Symptoms

Differences in verbal and nonverbal behavior between innocent and deceptive persons often can be observed, and are thus indicative of whether or not a suspect is telling the truth. A guilty suspect makes a conscious decision to resist your effort to get at the truth. In trying to maintain a structure of verbal lies, however, that suspect most often develops internal conflicts and tensions which manifest themselves in nonverbal behavior. Thus, body movements, facial expressions, eye contact, attitudes, posture and grooming gestures can indicate whether the subject is telling the truth or lying. Nonverbal indicators can also be used to determine whether the suspect under interrogation is listening, maintaining a defiant attitude or is ready to confess. You will learn how to observe and assess critical behavior symptoms and use those assessments to determine whether to move on to the next step of the interrogation.

Reid® Behavioral Analysis Interview (B.A.I.)

The information developed through use of the standard investigative questions of "who," "what," "when" and "how" is often not adequate — even in combination with physical evidence — to identify the wrongdoer. The Reid Behavioral Analysis Interview is a technique that uses a structured set of non-accusatory behavior-provoking questions developed as a result of many thousands of interviews. The B.A.I. makes it easier to determine whether the suspect is telling the truth about involvement in the matter under investigation, and is flexible enough to be used in cases ranging from employee theft to homicide.

The Reid Nine Steps of Interrogation®

The nine step approach to a successful interrogation has been developed by John E. Reid and Associates through extensive research and practical experience over a period of 60 years. Because of the subject's importance, approximately half the classroom time in the seminar is devoted to the interrogation process and detailed examination of each of the nine steps.

John Reid and Associates will provide the instructors for this class.
