# Freedom of Information Presentation & Juvenile Law Analysis and Update - Expungement

**Morning Session:** The **Freedom of Information Presentation** will contain a complete analysis of the current Freedom of Information Statute. This will include a detailed discussion of the terms and definitions listed in the Act. The Illinois Attorney General's guide to the application of the Freedom of Information Act will be analyzed. This will include the Attorney General's Opinions on this subject and their determinations of the various problems that arise in dealing with this subject. Relevant case law will be analyzed. Additionally, the Illinois Police Blotter Act and numerous other provisions that have been created to deal with this Act will be discussed and analyzed. Specific topics to be discussed include: the limitations of the Act, various definitions that must be considered, the time deadlines provided by the Act, and the various exclusions from the coverage of the Act. Various techniques in dealing with FOI requests will be discussed and the alternative methods of responding to these requests will be listed and analyzed. In addition, the Local Records Act will be discussed. "Local Records" will be defined. Guidelines for compliance with these provisions concerning both paper and electronic records will be discussed. The required methods of identifying, inventorying, and destroying local records will be analyzed.

## **Afternoon Session: Juvenile Law Analysis and Update - Expungement**

This presentation will feature an analysis of the most recent changes Illinois Juvenile Justice Law concerning the **Expungement and/or sealing of records in the possession of Law Enforcement Agencies. Particular attention will be paid to Juvenile records.** Included will be an overview of the current Illinois Juvenile Court Act with respect to Arrests, Interrogations, Chargeable Offenses, Sentencing and Maintenance of Records concerning Juveniles. The latest legislative amendments concerning Juvenile Justice will be listed and analyzed. Topics will also include changes in adult prosecutions for minors; sex offender registration changes for minors; and changes in the age requirements for minors to be treated as juveniles. Additionally, the latest case law concerning Juvenile Justice will be listed and analyzed.

**Course Description:** This one-day seminar is designed law enforcement officers tasked with street drug enforcement. The program concentrates on the newest drugs of abuse including synthetic stimulants (e.g... alpha-PVP "Flakka"), narcotics (e.g... U-47700 "U-4"), hallucinogenic (e.g. 25I-NBOMe "N-Bomb") cannabinoids (e.g... 5F-ADB "Smacked"), and counterfeit prescription drugs seen on the streets (e.g... Lemmon 714).

The latest drug seizure data focused on the local counties from the Illinois State Police Forensic Crime Lab will be presented. Updates on recent drug law changes will also be discussed. Officers will learn to identify and treat the most commonly encountered wound patterns and plan/execute an Officer-Citizen Extraction, then demonstrate the concepts and techniques learned during scenario-based exercises.

- **Students are asked wear clothing appropriate for physically demanding scenario training.** Course exercises will allow each student to apply critical lifesaving skills in a dynamic patrol-based setting.

On completion of the course, each participant will receive a North American Rescue Products Individual Patrol Officer Kit (IPOK) for duty use. Each sealed kit contains: One C-A-T Combat Application Tourniquet, an ETD Emergency Trauma Dressing, a packet of Z-Fold Gauze, and a pair of trauma gloves.

- Understand the role and relevance of psychophysical testing in pre-arrest screening of DWI suspects.
- Know and carry out appropriate administrative procedures for validated divided attention psychophysical tests.
- Know and carry out appropriate administrative procedures for the Horizontal Gaze Nystagmus test.
- Know and recognize typical clues of alcohol and/or other drug impairment that may be seen during administration of the Standardized Field Sobriety Tests.

**Course Description:** The Compassionate Use of Medical Cannabis Pilot Program Act enacted January 1, 2014, created new challenges for law enforcement personnel. According to statute, the law enforcement officer must have an independent, cannabis-related factual basis, giving reasonable suspicion that the person is impaired by cannabis. Subsequent to establishing these elements, an officer may ask the driver to submit to Standardized Field Sobriety Tests. Under this statute, the results of SFSTs will be the primary tool in determining impairment. The goal of this 8-hour block of instruction is to provide officers with an overview of the medical marijuana statute. The primary focus will be on enforcing the DUI segment, including the implied consent provision.

- **A Standardized Field Sobriety Testing proficiency exam will be given utilizing the most recent SFST curriculum. This exam will serve as a SFST recertification in order to satisfy IDOT requirements for DUI grants.**

Officers will also be provided information on non-standardized tests and eye exams which will aid in the determination of cannabis impairment. The ultimate goal is to reduce the number of crashes, deaths and injuries caused by impaired drivers.

- Summarize the Compassionate Use of Medical Cannabis Pilot Program Act
- Describe those individuals that may use or possess medical marijuana
- Describe those agencies capable of cultivating and selling medical marijuana

- Summarize scientific research related to driving and cannabis usage
- Administer SFSTs utilizing most recent curriculum
- Pass a SFST proficiency exam with standards from the most recent SFST curriculum
- Administer eye checks to determine cannabis usage
- Recognize signs and symptoms associated with cannabis usage
- Administer non-standardized field sobriety test
